

## **Research paper: "Peculiar Phenomena in the Battlefields and Measures to Be Taken** (November 1937-November 1939)"

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Annotation:

This research paper was authored by Dorao Hayao, a medical officer of the Army, in June 1939. Hayao, originally a professor at the Kanazawa Medical School, was conscripted as a 1st lieutenant of the reserve forces in the army in July 1937, immediately after the outbreak of the Sino-Japanese War.

This paper was written and submitted in June 1939, to analyze the causes of and solutions for the neurosis and mental illnesses the soldiers suffer in the battlefield. It has twenty-two topics and the topic related to the "comfort women" is 17, "sexual desire and rape." It says that Japanese soldiers had been indiscriminately raping Chinese women. It adds that even though the military authorities set up "comfort stations" to prevent the rapes, the number of rape cases remained the same, and the number of venereal diseases among the soldiers even increased. Hayao listed ten rape cases of Chinese women by the Japanese soldiers. He also pointed out that "the commanding officer condoned some of these cases as it was necessary to boost the soldiers' morale" and that "the military authorities did not find it strange and thus no one so far was singled out for discipline."

The paper also describes that:

- The Army installed "comfort stations" and staffed them with Japanese and Korean "comfort women" to prevent venereal diseases. However, venereal disease cases increased among soldiers and even officers. Officers took the lead in visiting "comfort stations" and encouraged soldiers to visit the facilities, too. Soldiers who refused to use a "comfort station" would be cursed at and told that they are crazy by officers.
- Whereas the Army would harass any women without shame, the Navy would not behave this way. It is probably because the Navy is better disciplined in general.
